Pre-loved uniform giveaway:

Carrying on with the ECO theme, we ensure that we always have a very substantial stock of pre-loved uniform which is collected and organised by the school office staff, Mr Mace and The Coppice Parent and Teacher Association (PTA).

Last week and this, we put out all of our uniform stock out for Parents and Carers to look through and take on their way out of school. There were many, happy takers and lots of positive comments about what a great initiative this is.

We believe passionately, as does our school's ECO committee, which is made up of children from our school who are voted for by their peers, that we should not only provide second-hand uniform to help people financially but also because it is good for the environment from a sustainability point of view. We therefore also have regular uniform giveaways at Parents' Evenings and Induction Events for Parents and Carers of children starting our school, as well as being more than happy to deal with individual requests directly at the school office.

We are proud to say that we will NEVER charge anything for pre-loved uniform. If a Parent or Carer wishes to make a donation to School Fund, and is in a position to do so, we will accept this and ensure that every penny is put back into further supporting children in our school e.g. through the purchase of additional resources or play equipment.



We are extremely proud of the work that our Eco Committee is doing throughout our school and we fully intend to explore other ways of making a positive impact moving forward.

Hopefully all of our hard work will result in the Green Flag flying high on our school site in the not too distant future!

Sunny weather: protecting your children:

It has been a lovely feeling over the course of the last couple of weeks to have been blessed with some spring sunshine, which always gives everyone a lift and puts smiles on people's faces.

In advance of the remainder of the summer term, it is a good time to remind you all about protecting your children from the sun's harmful rays and, therefore, of the school's policy with regards to the application of sunscreen.

The school's policy is as follows:

- Parents/Carers should apply an application of the product before school and pupils should be taught, at home, how to apply a 'top up', should it be required.

- Children can bring in a bottle of sunscreen during the summer months. **This MUST be an SPF 30 or above.**

- Children are allowed to re-apply sun cream once before lunchtime (a five minute window will be given) if Parents/Carers wish them to do so, especially those children with sensitive skin and those who are at high risk of sunburn. Parents/Carers will remind their children to do this when the weather is particularly warm.

- **Sun cream bottles must be labelled** and will be kept in a safe place in the classroom. Sun cream brought into school should be left in school for the duration of the Summer Term – teachers/staff will not be responsible for reminding children to take sun cream home at the end of each day.

-Staff will assist Foundation Stage (Nursery & Reception) pupils with the application of sun cream by giving them guidance. However, they will not be able to apply this directly - the child MUST do this themselves. If they are not capable of this, Parents/Carers will need to come into school to provide the top-up. In other year groups the children are responsible for their own application.

- 'Roller ball' applications are particularly good for young children as they are easier to use. You can buy branded ones and there are also ones called 'solar buddies', which you fill with a lotion of your choosing.

- Staff cannot be responsible for sun cream applied incorrectly by a child.

- Children should be taught at home never to share sun cream and we will reinforce this in school as well.

- Sunscreen will be applied before lunch - it won't be the responsibility of Lunchtime supervisors to do this

Thank you in advance for your cooperation with the above guidelines as it goes a long way to ensuring that we are a 'sun safe' school. Please also continue to send your child in with caps, sun hats and water bottles when the weather is warm as these all contribute to your child's safety and comfort.

We are always evaluating our OPAL Play provision and adding new options that appeal to our children. We want our playtimes to be the very best that they can be for all of our children

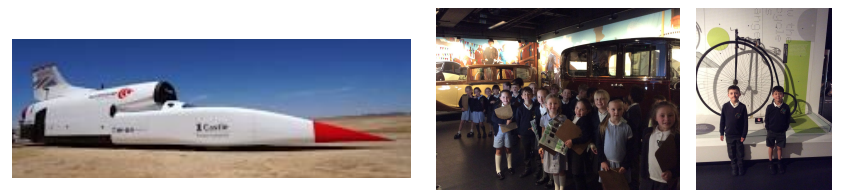


Year 2 have a wonderful day at Coventry Transport Museum:
