Science fair – exciting news!


We are excited to announce that our Coppice Science Fair is back for 2026 and will take place during the week beginning 9th March. This will be an inspiring week for the children and will be packed full of science-based activities, learning and stories as well as visits from 'The Wild Workshop' which is linked to the competition we won - very exciting! There will also be a science gadget sale on the playground after school two times during the week and more information will follow about this in future newsletters. Once again though, our fantastic PTA have kindly offered to run these stalls. The week's events have been organised by our Year 1 Teacher and Science Leader: Miss. Dixon and I'd like to thank her for all of her hard work in putting the week together. I know the children will greatly enjoy it!

Science Projects:

In advance of the week itself, we are running a science project competition for which Miss. Dixon has put together the following information if your child would like to take part:

There will be prizes for each of the categories:

- EYFS (Nursery & Reception)
- Years 1 & 2
- Years 3 & 4
- Years 5 & 6
- A whole school winner!



The project can be an age appropriate experiment to answer a question or a problem, along with a solution, or it could be a research project. It can be on any area of science that interests your child, for example 'Why do some people need glasses?', 'What is the best method to dry your teddy after their bath?' or 'Can people live on another planet?' Alternatively, the project could be researching a significant scientist who has made a difference to our everyday lives.

Once your child has carried out their investigation or research, they then have to make a display board to communicate their learning to others. This can be made from a large cardboard box opened out and then painted or covered in wrapping paper and held together with tape. It needs to have three panels of information (as shown above).

This display board should show the project title/question/problem, what your child thinks the answer is, what they did to investigate their question, what they found out and a conclusion. If they wish, they may also include a small model or experiment with their project.

Display boards must have the child's name, class and year group clearly visible or, unfortunately, we won't be able to judge them. All projects need to be in school by Friday 6th March. Judging will take place during the week of the 9th March and a panel of judges will help to choose the best projects. For the children: We can't wait to see your projects and we wish you all the very best with them! Good luck children!

Year 4 Egyptian Day:

On Egyptian day Year 4 did three activities. Firstly, the children sketched the death mask of King Tutankhamun and then used paints to decorate it. Secondly, they learned about hieroglyphics. They cracked a hieroglyphic code, wrote their name in hieroglyphics and made a bookmark. Finally, they conducted a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) project where they had to use marshmallows and dried spaghetti to make a pyramid as stable and big as possible. Year 6 pupils perform in Poetry Slam Final

In October 2025, a group of talented Year 6 pupils took part in an inspiring poetry workshop led by renowned Birmingham poet, Spoz. The experience sparked fantastic creativity and resulted in our brilliant team, *The Punctuation Punchers* (Abigail, Georgia, Ivy, Sienna, Florence and Summer), earning a place in the grand final of the Poetry Slam competition.

This year's theme was *play*, and the girls approached it with real thoughtfulness and maturity. Rather than simply celebrating games and fun, they explored the powerful idea that not every child across the world has the right or opportunity to enjoy play. Their poem delivered a moving message about fairness, equality and the importance of ensuring all children can experience the joy of childhood.



Throughout the writing process, the team impressed everyone with their imaginative ideas and meaningful reflections. Mrs Abbotts was incredibly proud of the creativity, passion and teamwork they demonstrated at every stage. For weeks, they have been fine-tuning their piece.

The final took place at The Old Rep Theatre in Birmingham, where nine schools performed their poems in front of a live audience. The atmosphere was electric, and our team delivered their poem with confidence and expression. After a fantastic evening of performances, *The Punctuation Punchers* were awarded an amazing **second place!**

We are incredibly proud of their achievement and the powerful message they shared. Well done, girls!
