Head Teacher's News

Christmas Productions

A few parents have been enquiring about Christmas productions. We are therefore informing you of some changes that we will be making this year and from hereon.

Increasingly, as the school expansion has gained apace, we have struggled with the logistics of fitting everything in around the availability of our school halls. This is not just around accommodating the actual performances on the day, but also the numerous associated rehearsals needed in advance of the final performance.

In addition, as those connected with schools will know, Ofsted, in their new inspection framework, have put increased emphasis on ensuring curriculum coverage in school. Accordingly, we are mindful that taking our halls out of use for many lessons for productions and rehearsals can impact negatively on the delivery of the Physical Education curriculum through both reducing coverage and the time spent on such an important subject. We therefore have no choice but to make these changes.

We have racked our brains to see how we can work around this. Accordingly, we are reducing the number of events that impact on our school halls. This means that Years 3, 4, 5, 6 and Nursery will no longer have a Christmas production in any of the school halls. However, Nursery will have a spring performance that parents will be invited to and the other year groups mentioned will do a videoed performance that will be screened at our Christmas Fair (as Year 6 did last year).

We will still ensure performances though, through our class assemblies which parents will always be invited to. These will remain a firm fixture in The Coppice calendar.

Parent's Evening

Our school vision is for 'Happy, confident and successful learners....well prepared for life'. The old adage 'Give me a child until he is seven and I will show you the man' is very much what this vision for our primary school is about. The primary years are the most important years, moulding a child for what is to come.

As a school we are determined to give our children every advantage we can to fulfil our vision for them. Parents and home life are the most important influence on a child. Accordingly, we need your help in making our children the best they can be. To help optimise the partnership between parents and school we have established the following format for Parents' Evenings.

We want to do our best to provide a meeting with quality time that parents find easy to attend. Because of this we have created 15 minute time slots and have increased the hours we conduct Parents' Evenings to incorporate afternoon slots too.

In addition, <u>we will also expect the child to attend the meeting with you</u> because we think it is important that the children are there to hear the messages and understand what they need to do to improve.

We will try to keep the meeting business like, clearly focusing on three main things:

1. Regarding achievement, where is the child now? - how do they compare with national norms?

- 2. Where do we want them to realistically be?
- 3. What are we going to do to get them there?

By the end of the meeting it is hoped that parents will leave with a clear understanding of:

- What their child's strengths/weaknesses are
- What their child is finding difficult and how parents can help with this**
- Whether their child tries hard enough
- Whether their child participates properly
- How parents can help with their child's schoolwork in general
- Whether their child has made sufficient progress
- Whether their child is happy at school
- Whether their child's behaviour gives any cause for concern

** You should have a good understanding of what your children's targets are and how you can access their updated targets as they change over the weeks.
