He is completely au fait with our vision and the way forward and has contributed immensely to the success of The Coppice over the years. For quite a few years now, since taking on the deputy's role, we have worked pretty much hand-in-hand. So, moving forward, I know that the leadership of The Coppice will be in very good hands.

There's still half a year before I actually do retire, so I'll be around for a while, and there will be plenty of opportunity for me to say my piece, but, as a precursor, I would like to say that it has been an absolute privilege being headteacher of The Coppice - definitely the highlight of my career.

Hopefully, before July, as a school, we will be properly back into the swing of things, inviting parents into school for productions and assemblies (which have been greatly missed). I look forward to seeing more of you then to say a proper goodbye. It will be a different (but reassuringly familiar) face fronting these events from September!

It seems odd giving you this news so far in advance, but I know that Mr. Hutt is delighted and proud to take on this role, and, as he has been appointed, it seemed only fair to share the news, as well as reassure families before things slip out through the rumour-mill.

"We were wondering if you are were getting out and about on daily walks, runs, cycles, scoots etc. Which led us to think abut how far, as a school, we were all travelling during our time out exercising.

If we collated all the kilometres travelled (on foot, bike, scooter, horse, on treadmills etc.) how far could we get?

It is only 11km from school to The Bullring in Birmingham, surely we should get there pretty quickly.

It is 40.4km to our county town of Worcester - We are sure we could get there?

It is 182km from school to the London Eye- could we get there?

It is 464km to Edinburgh Castle - could we get there?

It is 1308km from Land's End- could we possibly get there?

Please post the distance you go by any mode (except car, bus, train, plane etc.) on this page and we will add it up and see how far we can get.

There are different ways of finding out how far you have gone . If you don't have access to a smart watch/Fitbit/pedometer you can use Google maps or a phone app such as Strava or plotaroute.

Just add your distance daily or weekly and we will tot them up and update you regularly."

This post has been pinned at the top of our Facebook page and you can add on your contribution at any time.

As this article is being written the cumulative distance we have travelled is 116.75km.

That means we have already walked more than the distance from school to Alton Towers Theme Park!
