

The Coppice Whole School Newsletter Friday 21st January 2022

Dear Parents and Carers,

As always, I hope that you've all had a good week and are looking forward to the weekend with your children and a chance to spend some quality time together. Hopefully it will be a dry, bright weekend!

It's been another busy week in school and I've loved going around all of the different classes in school and talking to the children about their learning. I've had discussions with children in Nursery about their amazing creations made from wooden blocks; experienced the incredible joy of watching the children learning their phonics in Reception; been mesmerised by the children in Year 1 with their knowledge of bees; watched the children learning spelling strategies to enable them to spell three syllable words accurately in Year 2 e.g. magnetic; discussed facts and opinions with Year 3, where all the statements were to do with Mr. Hutt (thankfully all of the responses were very positive!); spent time with Year 4 as they developed their knowledge of different sentence types; talked to Year 5 children regarding their fascinating learning about early Islamic culture and Baghdad as a city; and had some really great problem-solving discussions with children in Year 6 as they worked on converting fractions, decimals and percentages.

I can honestly say that watching children learn and develop is the greatest privilege and I once again, I was left feeling that I genuinely believe I have the best job in the world!

Year 1 Beekeeper visit:

As mentioned above, Year 1 have greatly enjoyed learning facts all about bees as part of their English information writing, for which the children have been busy writing leaflets and creating information posters. To really bring this to life, we were thrilled, this week, to have had a visit from one of our parents: Mrs. Turner who is a real-life beekeeper! The children, as you can see from the photographs below were enthralled by the talk that was given and it was fabulous for them to be able to see key components of a beehive and to learn all about the different types of bees and what their different roles are. All of this new knowledge learnt by the children will be put to even more use when they begin to write their stories about 'The Sleepy Bumble Bee' in their next Talk for Writing unit. I can't wait to read some of them and to spot some of the facts that the children have told me about.

Obviously, the Year 1 staff and children want to send a huge thank you to Mrs. Turner for giving up her time to talk to the children and for giving such an inspiring and enjoyable talk. We can't wait to have her back again at some point in the future.





Nursery celebration certificates:

It was lovely to be able to go into Nursery with Mrs. Ashwell twice this week in order to give out certificates and stickers to some of the children. These are always special times and I always look forward to them. Some of the reasons for the children receiving the certificates were for listening really well, being kind to others, being a fantastic friend, always using beautiful manners and for working hard every day.

As you can see from all of the above reasons, we make sure that we recognise and reward our children for exhibiting the elements of 'The Coppice Way' from the moment that they enter the school. As you know, we want all of our children to be responsible, respectful and polite and we recognise very clearly that these values start right at the very beginning of a child's life and educational journey. It is therefore absolutely right that we celebrate these values when we see them being used. We also recognise how hard as well that you, as parents and carers, ensure at home that your children have these values from the moment that they are born and we thank you for this.

Next week we will be celebrating achievements in our Reception classes, which will be another lovely occasion.

Staff and curriculum pages on the newly updated website:

I wanted to make you all aware that this week, we have added the staff photo pages to our newly updated school website. I am very aware that sometimes your children may mention an adult's name, who works with them in school, but you may not know them or have met them, especially with everything that has happened over the last couple of years. If you go the 'our people' tab and then click on 'meet the staff', you will be directed, at the bottom of the page, to a very clear and up-to date PDF document that shows you pictures of all of the staff in the different year groups: Teachers, Teaching Assistants and Special Support Assistants. We have also created pages for our Leadership team, SEND (Special Educational Needs Team), Thrive team, Cover teachers, Intervention teachers, Site staff, Lunchtime Supervisors and Cleaners.

As a big school, I feel it is really important that you are aware of everyone who works in school, can put a face to the name and can see what their role is.

If you haven't had chance to have a look at the website yet, we strongly encourage you to do so as there has been a lot of updated curriculum information added that we know you will find very useful for giving you a clear and detailed picture of what your child is learning at school for each of the curriculum subjects. There are also some really useful documents that will help you support your child in school e.g. our Maths Calculation Policy which clearly explains the different calculation strategies that we use in every year group of school. This is particularly helpful if you are someone who was taught maths very differently, which is something we often have said to us by parents and carers.

As I've said before, lots more will be added to the website over the coming weeks and months so keep having a look when you get a moment.

Finally, I just want to end by saying that obviously there has been a Government update on mask-wearing this week. As a school, and obviously one that is still experiencing a significant number of positive cases in school, I want to encourage you all to continue wearing them whilst on the school site at the current time, in order to continue to help keep our children and staff safe. Should our view on this change, I will of course let you know straightaway.

That just leaves me to wish you all a lovely weekend. As always, we greatly look forward to welcoming the children bright and early on Monday morning.

IMPORTANT - Bank Holiday dates

Eco News

The Eco Committee met this week to finalise their Eco Action Plan. This includes tackling a wide range of issues that have been identified in our evaluation of the school, from recycling, to reducing waste and reducing our overall energy consumption.

We have lots of exciting plans and we are proud to share with you that from next week (Monday 24th January) we will be recycling crisp packets. The scheme is run by TerraCycle who aim to eliminate the idea of waste by recycling the 'non-recyclable'. Accepted waste includes ANY brand of crisp packet as long as they are empty and not folded. Once the packets are collected from school. they will be separated by plastic type, cleaned and extruded into plastic pellets to make new recycled products.

From Monday, there will be a crisp packet recycling post box in the old hall so once your child has finished eating they can post their empty crisp packet into the box. If your child does not eat their lunch in the old hall, Eco Ambassadors will be responsible for collecting the crisp packets from the class and posting them into our recycling bin.

This is something that we are really excited about and we hope that by everyone doing their small bit we can make a big difference.
