
Book folders must be returned on a Friday, we can not issue you a new reading book if we have not received your current book back.

## The benefits of retelling a story.



Asking a child to retell a story has many advantages. The main benefits being that it improves their memory skills and builds comprehension as it encourages them to explore the plot and understand the key points of a story. It also develops sequencing skills, something that many children find difficult at this age. Finally it builds confidence and engages them, it shows that you are interested in what they are learning and thinking. You don't always have to read the story to your child first. Ask them to tell you a story about a wordless book, or about the picture of a book they are looking at. Even reluctant readers enjoy this bonding activity. Add some creativity by taking turns retelling the story!
