


Our Week Ahead Week beginning: 16th March 2020

When the sun come up and down in the sky.



Reading at home.

Some key tips for helping your child get the most from their reading books at home. Adults can ask questions to the child when reading together:

- The "5 W's" Who? What? Where? When? And Why? See the poster above.
- Use a mixture of closed questions (for example, did the character find the toy?) and open questions (for example, why do you think the character did that?).
- Ask children to summarise what has happened in the book up to a certain point.
- Ask children to predict what might happen next in the story.
- Make links to the child's own experiences for example when reading about Cinderella going to a ball, you could compare this to being like a party such as a birthday party.
